Delphinium occidentale Buttercup Family

- Larger of the Larkspur species
- Found in montane meadows, prairies, thickets & streambanks
- Is associated with Aspen & Spruce groves
- Native Americans & early settlers used its bright flowers to make blue ink
- Common name comes from resemblance of blossoms to the claw of a Lark
- Toxic to cattle, sheep & horses
